Fashion Club

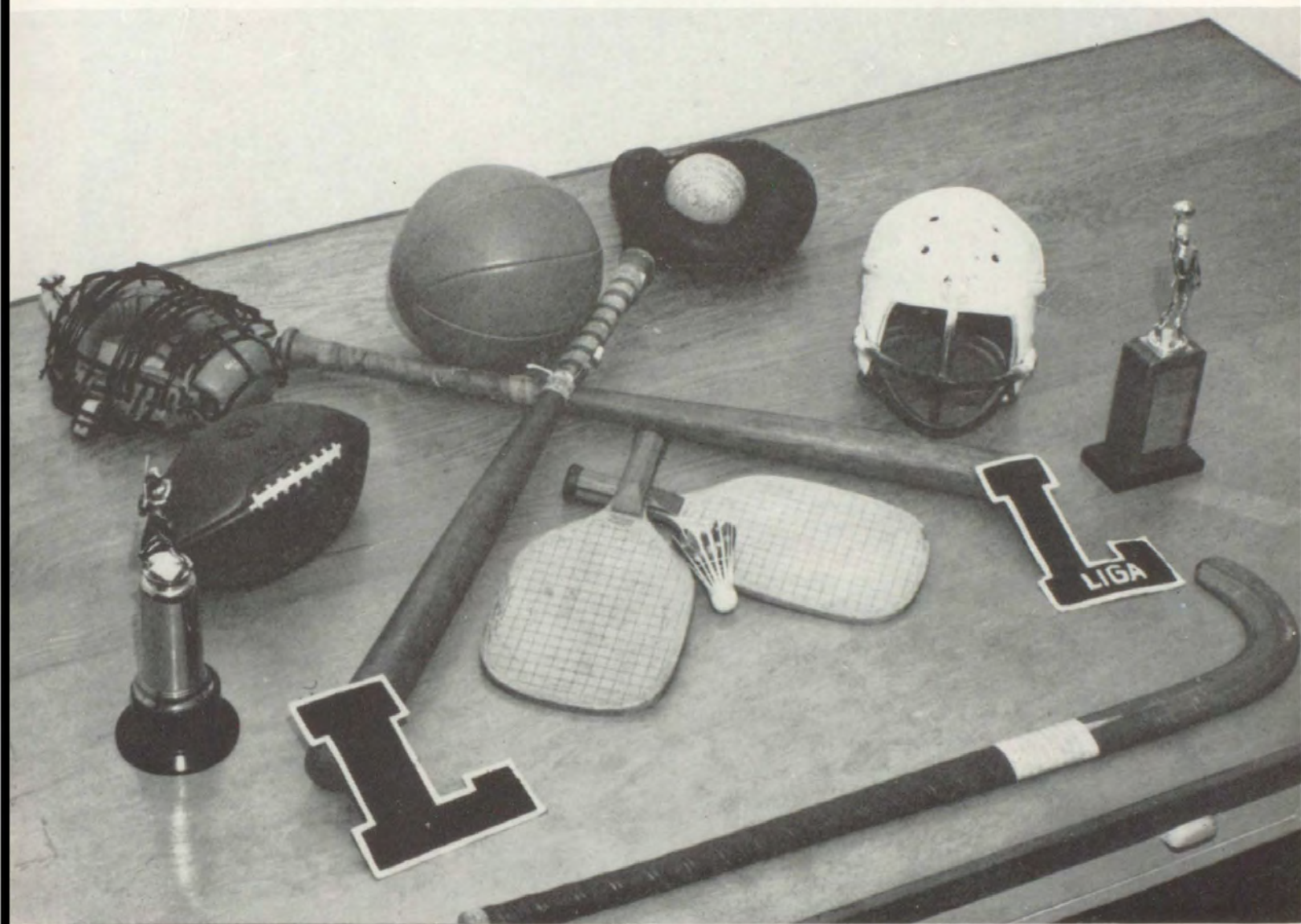

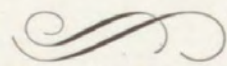
