



CAMERA CLUB






The club has approximately twenty members. Practice is held four nights a week after school and every Tuesday from 1-1:30, weather permitting.




GYM CLUB

One of the main events was the obstacle course, similar to that given in the army. Each boy was timed as he went over it and the one who covered it in the shortest time was James Laurita.




BAND


Members of the band participated in the assembly program for "Youths Day". They were divided into two groups, Liberal and Conservative.



BASKETBALL


